

# Faculty Biographies

**Hon. Janet S. Baer** is a U.S. Bankruptcy Judge for the Northern District of Illinois in Chicago, appointed on March 5, 2012. Previously, she was a restructuring lawyer for more than 25 years and was involved in some of the most significant chapter 11 bankruptcy cases in the country. The majority of her practice focused on the representation of large, publicly held debtors in both restructuring and chapter 11 matters, and she also represented companies in commercial litigation matters, including lender liability, fraud, breach of contract and breach of fiduciary duty. Prior to forming her own firm in 2009, Judge Baer was a partner at Kirkland & Ellis LLP, Winston & Strawn and Schwartz, Cooper, Greenberger & Krauss. She is currently the judicial chair of ABI's Seventh Circuit Consumer Bankruptcy Conference, a member of the National Conference of Bankruptcy Judges Next Generation Committee and Future of the NCBJ Committee, and a board member of the Chicago chapter of the International Women's Insolvency & Restructuring Confederation. She is a frequent speaker for ABI, the Chicago Bar Association, IWIRC and the Turnaround Management Association. Judge Baer earned her B.A. from the University of Wisconsin - Madison and her J.D. from DePaul College of Law.

**C.R. "Chip" Bowles** is a partner in the law firm of Bingham Greenebaum Doll LLP in Louisville, Ky., where he concentrates his practice in the areas of bankruptcy distressed-asset sales, professional compensation in bankruptcy cases, bankruptcy ethics, bankruptcy litigation on behalf of trustees and chapter 11 estates, environmental issues in bankruptcy cases, domestic-relations issues in bankruptcy proceedings, and debtor and creditor rights. He lectures and writes extensively on bankruptcy law and authored ABI's book *Getting Paid: Retention and Compensation in Bankruptcy Cases—A Guide for Non-Attorney Professionals and the Attorneys Who Represent Them*, now in its Second Edition. He is also a past editor of *The Broken Bench and Bar*, the newsletter of the Kentucky Bar Association's Bankruptcy Section. Mr. Bowles was recognized in *The Best Lawyers in America* from 2007-14 and *Kentucky Super Lawyers* from 2007-12. He received his B.A. *magna cum laude* from the University of Kentucky and his J.D. *magna cum laude* from University of Kentucky College of Law.

Previously, he was a partner at Faegre Baker Daniels LLP and had been in private practice for 38 years, focusing on the representation of business debtors and creditors in chapter 11 cases, financial restructurings and commercial litigation. Judge Carr is Board Certified in Business Bankruptcy Law by the American Board of Certification, is a Fellow in the American College of Bankruptcy and the American Bar Foundation, and is a member of the American Bar Association, the Indiana State Bar Association (for which he is a past chair of its Bankruptcy and Creditors' Rights Section) and the Indianapolis Bar Association (for which he is a past chair of its Commercial and Bankruptcy Law Section). He is also a past chair and president of the Indiana Association for Corporate Renewal. Judge Carr was named in *The Best Lawyers in America* from 1987-2012 in Bankruptcy and Creditor Rights, Insolvency and Reorganization Law and Bankruptcy Litigation, and has been a panelist and chair of many seminars on bankruptcy, reorganization, creditor rights and lender liability sponsored by the Indiana Continuing Legal Education Forum, Federal Bar Association and Indiana Bankers Association. He is also an adjunct professor at the Indiana University Maurer School of Law, served on the law school's Board of Visitors, and is a past member and president of its Alumni Board. Judge Carr received his B.A. in English from Indiana University in 1972 and his J.D. *magna cum laude* in 1975 from the Indiana University Maurer School of Law in Bloomington, where he was a member of the Order of the Coif.

**Hon. Donald R. Cassling** is a U.S. Bankruptcy Judge for the Northern District of Illinois in Chicago, sworn in on Jan. 18, 2012. Prior to his appointment, he was a partner at Jenner & Block and at Quarles & Brady in Chicago, where he had a national practice in commercial and patent-infringement law, as well as bankruptcy litigation, and represented chapter 11 debtors in possession, creditors' committees, individual creditors and chapter 11 trustees. Upon graduation from law school, he clerked for Chief Judge John R. Brown of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit before returning to Chicago to practice law. Judge Cassling has written and lectured extensively on the UCC, banking law and commercial litigation and has testified as an expert witness on the Illinois UCC. From 2003-11, Judge Cassling wrote "Banking Briefs," a banking litigation column for *The Banking Law Journal*, and served as a member of its board of editors. He has also participated as a faculty member for the National Institute of Trial Advocacy and was selected as an *Illinois Super Lawyer* from 2009-12. Judge Cassling earned his A.B. from Duke University and his J.D. from the University of Chicago Law School, where he was an editor of the *University of Chicago Law Review*.

Prior to her appointment to the bench, she was in private practice, concentrating in bankruptcy and commercial transactions and litigation. Judge Gorman is a past president of the Winnebago County Bar Association and has been active on the Illinois State Bar Association's Task Force on the Unauthorized Practice of Law and the Commercial, Banking, and Bankruptcy Section Council. She is a member of the National Conference of Bankruptcy Judges, ABI, and the Illinois State, Winnebago County, and Sangamon County Bar Associations. From 1999-2003, Judge Gorman was an adjunct professor of bankruptcy law at the Northern Illinois University College of Law. She has served on the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts' Bankruptcy Judges Advisory Group and Budget and Finance Advisory Council, and she currently serves as one of the five bankruptcy judge representatives on the Judicial Conference Committee on the Administration of the Bankruptcy System. He was also selected as one of Indiana’s top 50 lawyers by *Law and Politics* as printed in *Indiana Monthly* magazine, and he helped draft Indiana’s newly enacted Exemption Law. Mr. Zuckerberg was awarded Master Distinguished Fellow by the Indianapolis Bar Association. He received his B.A. from Indiana University and his J.D. from Capital University.
